

GET THIS LOOK

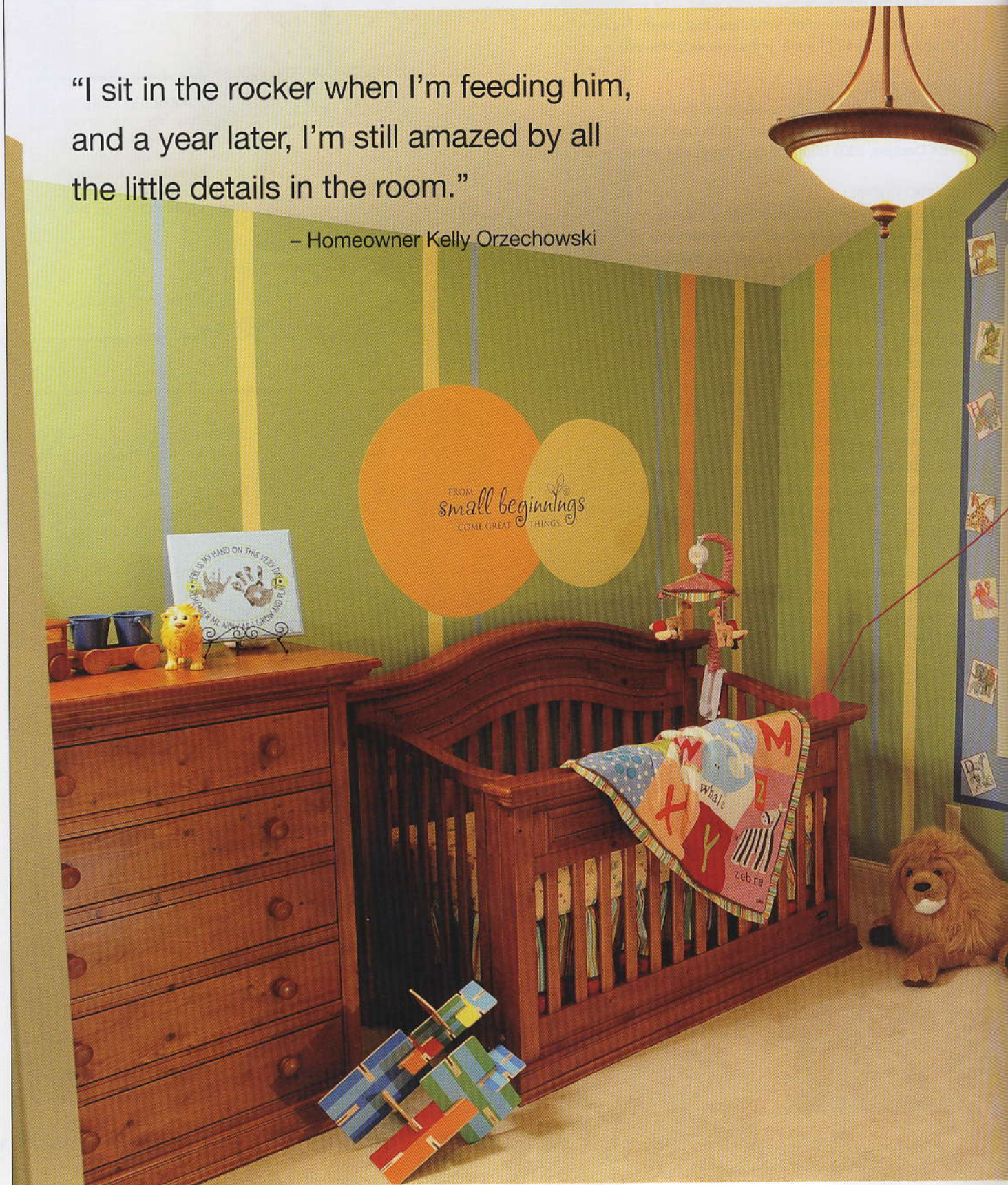

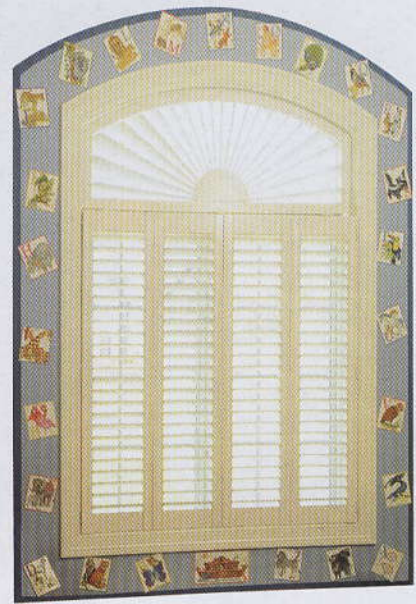
IDEA
